FACILITATING CONVERSATIONS about sensitive topics...

- What ground rules need to be laid out before dialogue begins? How do I help make sure those guidelines are understood by all and implemented?
- Specifically, how do I welcome diverse perspectives, redirect a person who is dominating the conversation, encourage good open questions, and guide conversations that are both respectful and insightful?

ADDITIONAL QUESTIONS...

- How can I encourage a group that's been meeting for awhile to go a step deeper with their conversation?
- What are some ideas for moving beyond the "liberal" folks who typically show up and create a space for people with really divergent views?
- How can we start with collaboration on community issues and increase interfaith understanding in the process?
- What are some best practices and guidelines for offering healing and care in multi-faith settings?
- How can I stand up respectfully to others with biased/limited views of other faith traditions?
