#4 - Use your committees

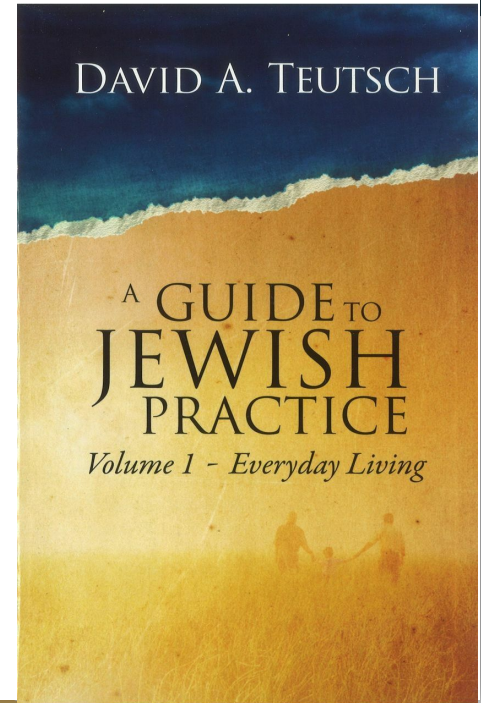

#5 - Study up on Jewish Speech Ethics

“Gossip that involves repeating unflattering facts has the capacity to do irreparable harm to the individuals discussed. Exchanging information about our lives, building relationships, and networking are not forms of gossip, though they are sometimes unfairly and incorrectly categorized that way. Gossip involves statements that are damaging. When those damaging statements are true, they are usually known as *l’shon hara*, bad speech,. Such gossip need not be done with ill intent in order to be damaging. The original speaker cannot know its effect on the hearer or on anyone else who hears it later. A person who listens to *l’shon hara* without a morally significant reason to do so is a partner in an immoral act. After all, gossip requires both a speaker and a listener. The preferable response is asking the speaker to stop or simply walking away.” -pg. 123

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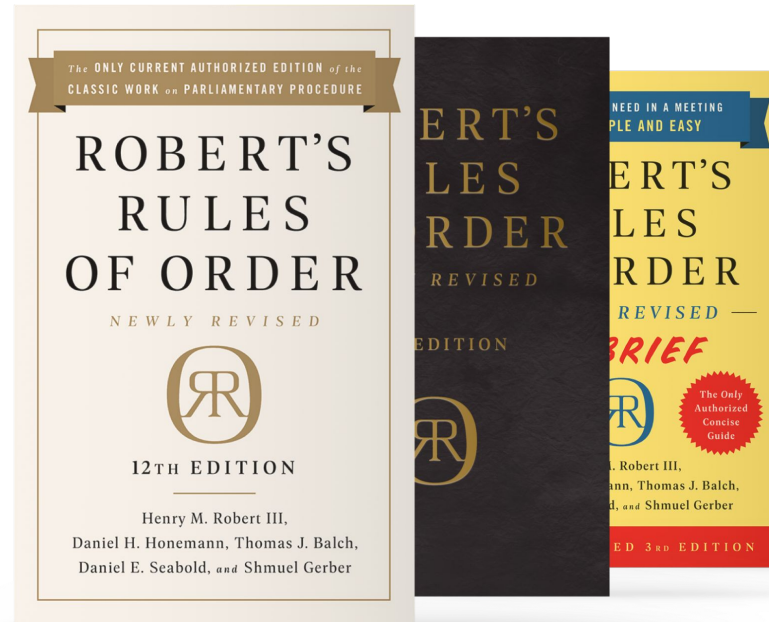

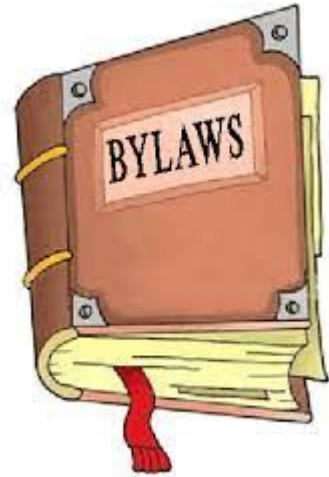
