

PAM SOMMERS

Adat Shalom



Pam Sommers grew up in Chicago and attended Anshe Emet Day School from Kindergarten through Eighth Grade. She attributes her love of Torah, Haftarah and, especially, cantillation to her teachers there, particularly Hanna Lubowsky and "Uncle" Ben Aronin. Their inspiration led to her tutoring her sons Gabe and Greg on the road to their becoming B'nai Mitzvah, and eventually to her work as an accomplished tutor of well over one hundred young men and women at Adat Shalom and elsewhere.

A conservatory-trained pianist and singer, Pam began her career as a performing arts critic for *The Washington Post* and other publications. She eventually focused more and more on teaching and directing, which led to positions as music and drama teacher at Capitol Hill Day

School, The Maret School, Jewish Primary Day School and other local institutions. After Pam and her family joined Adat Shalom in 1993, she joined the choir and soon became a regular on the *bimah*, also singing in the chamber group and as part of a trio with her sister Lisa Sommers and Rabbi Rachel Hersh.

Working with young people is Pam's passion, especially those in middle and high school. She created and directs Tikkun Ha'lr, an immersive service learning program about hunger, homelessness and gentrification in DC. Participants spend 3 days living in a church, working at food kitchens and shelters, and engaging simulations of homelessness and food insecurity. She directs Chords of Glory: Performance with a Purpose, an ensemble of sixth through eleventh grade singers who perform almost exclusively at shelters, senior centers and rehab facilities. She runs the Teen Torah Takeover, a biannual event in which teens lead the entire Torah Service. And she facilitates two Rosh Hodesh discussion groups for tween and teen girls.

And, together with Rabbi Sid Schwarz, Pam has led the five Adat Shalom Service Missions to Leogane, Haiti.

FRED PINKNEY

Adat Shalom

Fred grew up in the Detroit area, went to Hebrew school and had his Bar Mitzvah at the Conservative synagogue, Adat Shalom. He also attended Birmingham Temple, the first Jewish Humanist Congregation, with his parents occasionally.

After graduating from University of Michigan, he moved to Washington, D.C. to work for an environmental consulting firm and lived in a shared group house where he met Pam. They lived in New York before settling in Takoma Park, MD, where they considered joining Adat Shalom. Fred, firmly entrenched in Humanism, was impressed with Rabbi Sid Schwarz but told him he only had two problems – prayer and God. Rabbi Sid told him not to worry.

Fred's involvement at Adat Shalom took a quantum leap at a 2009 High Holiday service, when members were challenged to take ownership of a project. Rabbi Fred Dobb had proposed a vegetable garden; several months later ground was broken. Over the past 10 years, the Mishnah Garden has provided hundreds of pounds of food to shelters and Manna, a non-profit. The mission is to build community through studying Jewish agrarian roots and modern gardening, while



sharing the harvest. Highlights include building a composter, growing wheat and turning it into bread, and processing homegrown horseradish for Pesach. As part of Adat Shalom's Haiti Missions, Fred helped build Gan HaMazon, the Garden of Plenty, at our partner school/church in Leogane.

When not gardening, Fred enjoys working at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Annapolis, Maryland. His focus is on reducing fish contamination in the Anacostia River and Chesapeake Bay watershed. He is an avid softball player and aspiring jazz pianist.

KEN STAUBS

Beit Tikvah

Ken Staubs was born and raised as a Methodist in rural Anne Arundel County. As a child attending Sunday School, he knew even then that he didn't belong there and he'd often escape class, returning just in time for his mother to pick him up.

Ken's first introduction to Judaism came when he met his future wife, Karen, who told him she couldn't marry a non-Jew. The first Rabbi he approached dismissed him twice. After stumbling upon Beit Tikvah, student Rabbi Leila Berner enthusiastically agreed to help Ken in his Jewish journey. Some of his fondest memories include choosing his Jewish name, Noah Moshe, and being in the swimming pool at RRC to perform the mikvah rituals.

Beit Tikvah became home for Ken and his three daughters, Katie, Shelby and Heather. Ken and Karen had two more children, Savannah and Jacob, who all became active participants in synagogue life.

In 2016, curious over a family story about Native American roots, and to ascertain his membership in a tribe, Ken took a DNA test. However, there was no Native American ancestry. Instead, it showed that he had Eastern European Jewish roots, and found out that his mother's great grandmother was Jewish!



According to matrilineal descent, he was an official member of the Jewish tribe!

Statement

"My family at Beit Tikvah (BT) has been an integral part of filling in the missing pieces in my life. I thrive on hearing everyone's stories about what life was like growing up in a Jewish household, and I coalesce their histories into mine. I realize that I am part of something much larger than what shows on the surface. The extended BT community has become my Jewish cousins, sisters, brothers, aunts and uncles, as I constantly learn from them and forge my own Jewish identity."

BETTY & PETER SILVERGLATE CJC



Betty and Peter were raised in Jewish households, and Judaism has always been part of their identity. Jewish celebrations were a highlight of Betty's childhood and adulthood growing up in Connecticut. Betty and Peter met at a social dance in the Bridgeport, Connecticut Jewish Center. Soon after they were married, and moved to Monroe, Connecticut.

They were introduced to the Reconstructionist movement in 1987 when they joined Shirei Shalom, a Reconstructionist synagogue in Connecticut. Peter helped lead services at Shirei Shalom and served on its board. They joined Columbia Jewish Congregation (CJC) when they moved to Maryland. Their children, Lauren and Bobby, have both had their B'nai Mitzvah at CJC, and Betty became an adult Bat Mitzvah in 2004 at CJC, which she found to

be a very meaningful experience.

Betty has been involved with the Adult Education Committee for around fifteen years, as a participant and currently as a cochair, along with Del Stanfield. She also served on the CJC Board for two years. Peter has read Torah and contributed drashes to CJC services.

Peter and Betty enjoy celebrating all the Jewish holidays at CJC. Betty enjoys Israeli dancing and Peter participates in the bible study group. They have both enjoyed participating in Chapter 2, the retirement group at CJC, as they have gone on many outings with them. They are active members of the Jewish Federation of Howard County and have gone to Israel twice under their auspices and once with Betty's family. They are also active members of AIPAC and Kulanu.

RAYNA AYLWARD

Kol Ami

Growing up, Rayna's father was a Catholic priest and her Jewish mother was a professed atheist – not the most promising start for a life in Judaism. But the call of the tribe's culture and history grew stronger as Rayna grew up. She lived in Israel twice and it was there that she came to fully embrace her Jewish identity.

Rayna's religious affiliation remained tenuous until her friends introduced her to Reconstructionism. She was impressed by the movement's respect for tradition, blended with its innovational freedom and inclusiveness. This spurred her to become a founding member of the Reconstructionist community, Kol Ami.

At Kol Ami, Rayna has served as president and in a variety of other leadership roles. Currently, she cochairs Kol Ami's Care & Concern/Inclusion Committee. She's also studying for her Adult Bat Mitzvah in May!

Rayna's professional accomplishments include teaching English and serving as a U.S. diplomat overseas, heading a corporate foundation and serving as a presidential appointee in the U.S. Department of Education. She lives with her husband, Ed, in Annandale, VA,



and has a stepdaughter, Erica, sonin-law, Chris, and two "perfect" granddaughters.

Kol Ami



Toni grew up in Norfolk, Virginia, where her grandparents were founding members of a Conservative Synagogue. She attended the synagogue's Preschool, Hebrew School, Sunday School, and became a Bat Mitzvah. Toni was very active in BBYO in her teenage years.

Her favorite family memories are of having large, multi-generational holiday meals. During those holiday meals, Toni learned to cook many Jewish family recipes and still has them written on small cards today.

After moving to NoVA in 1988, she lost touch with her Jewish roots. The Reconstructionist community brought her back after seeing a notification about a new Reconstructionist community forming in 2000. She went to see what it was all about and was sold!

Today, Toni lives in Alexandria, Virginia, with her service dog, Bud. Together, they do speaking engagements, education, and advocacy on a local, state, and federal level for people who have a disability. In her spare time, she does crafts of many types.

MARK LOEWENSTEIN


Mishkan Torah

Mark grew up in Arizona, obtained a Ph.D. in economics from Northwestern University, and taught at Purdue and Virginia Tech before taking a job at the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, where he's currently a senior research economist.

Mark and his wife, Kangping, an intellectual property lawyer and ombudsman, have two children together. Simon attends Montgomery College and loves playing the guitar, while Eva is a freshman in the University of Maryland.

Mark was not a member of a synagogue for many years, but then he started shul shopping after having Simon and Eva. He found Mishkan Torah during High Holiday services one year and heard about Rabbi Jonathan Cohen's study session on the Hebrew Bible. After attending, Mark obtained a newfound appreciation of the Hebrew Bible, learning that there are different ways of approaching the Bible and one did not need to take it literally. Perhaps more importantly, the study session was his first introduction to Reconstructionism, which corresponded with the way he viewed the world.

An appealing feature of Mishkan



Torah to Mark was that the Hebrew School met on Shabbat mornings. So after dropping off Simon and Eva for school, Mark began attending Shabbat morning services regularly. His participation increased over time as his skills improved, and he has been gabbai on occasion.

In his time with Mishkan Torah, Mark has served in many volunteer roles. He has been on the High Holiday Honors Committee, the webmaster, and in charge of scheduling kiddush helpers. Mark has also chaired the Religious Committee, an assignment he kept until last year.
