




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What is the World Zionist Congress?



To vote for the 39th World Zionist Congress, you must be:

- Jewish (and not subscribe to another religion)
- 18 years or older by June 30, 2025
- A U.S. citizen or a legal permanent resident in the U.S., with primary US residence
- Affirm your commitment to the Jerusalem Program (the Zionist movement platform)
- Have not voted in the November 2022 Knesset election (and will not vote in any future Knesset election which may be held prior to July 28, 2025)



Elections for the WZC run March 10 - May 4, 2025.

Where We Stand:

The Reconstructionist Movement, Israel and Zionism (2024)

From our movement's beginnings in the 1920s, we have expressed a deep commitment to the flourishing of Jewish life in the Land of Israel based on principles of democracy, Jewish religious pluralism, Jewish cultural renewal and the pursuit of compromise and peace with the Palestinians. In the decades since 1967, when Israel began its military rule over the Palestinians of the West Bank and Gaza and began building Jewish settlements there, the central organizations of our movement have approved multiple resolutions and published substantive reports calling for an end to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict based on the following five principles:

- 1. Securing Israel's place in the Middle East as a Jewish and democratic state according to the vision expressed in its Declaration of Independence;
- 2. Ending Israel's military occupation of the West Bank and Gaza;
- 3. Halting the expansion of settlements in those same territories;
- 4. Establishing a democratic Palestinian state alongside Israel within final borders to be agreed by both parties; and
- 5. Supporting Israeli and Palestinian negotiations seeking to achieve mutually agreed creative compromises to resolve the complex issues involving Jerusalem and Palestinian refugees.

What are the goals of the Hatikvah Slate?

The Diaspora Voice

Grade(s): 4-12th

Number of participants: 4 or more

Time needed: 60-75 min



Goal(s):

Students will understand the role of the World Zionist Congress and its impact on global Jewry.

Objectives:

Students will:

- Learn the history and purpose of the World Zionist Congress
- · Participate in an election and congressional simulation
- Explore some of the issues decided by the WZC and understand their impact on Israel and global Jewry

World Zionist Congress

Key Terms

A group of elected delegates who vote for executive leadership, allocate funding, and decide policies for the World Zionist Organization and the Jewish Agency.

World Zionist Organization

A non-governmental organization that promotes Zionism globally through Israel education and political advocacy. Founded in 1897 by Theodore Herzl.

Zionism

A political ideology that supports the creation and existence of a Jewish state in the Land of Israel.

Progressive Zionism

A political ideology that supports the existence of the State of Israel, opposition to the occupation, and ensuring safety and security for Israelis and Palestinians.

Opening Activity

Materials:

- Whiteboard or large paper
- · Pencils or markers

Set Up:

Write headings on the whiteboard:

- Zionism,
- Theodore Herzl
- Israel,
- Jewish Diaspora

Time needed:

10-15 minutes

Directions:

For students who can write, give them writing tools and ask them to write words or phrases they associate with each of the words underneath the heading.

For students who cannot write, ask the class to take turns sharing what they know about these topics. Write their answers under the headings.

Depending on your class, some students may know a lot about these topics and others might know very little. Encourage students to write something under each heading, even if it isn't a complete idea or just a question mark. This will help you gauge the class's collection knowledge.

Once everyone has contributed ideas, share the ideas aloud and invite students to ask clarifying questions if they have any.

You may want to begin by reminding everyone that many Jews have strong and different feelings about the State of Israel. Encourage students to be curious about each other's ideas, even if they disagree.

Definitions of Terms:

Zionism: a political ideology supporting the existence of a Jewish state Theodore Herzl: Considered the "father of Zionism", Herzl Israel: the ancestral Jewish homeland; today, the modern State of Israel Jewish Diaspora: Jews living outside the Land of Israel

We will now explore these terms, and students' ideas around them, in more detail.

Designate one side of the room as "Agree" and one side "Disagree". For this next activity, students should position themselves along that spectrum to answer the questions below. After asking the questions, allow students to share more about their answers if they wish.

Statements:

- I have been to Israel
- I have a family member or friend from Israel
- My family and/or friends talk a lot about Israel, or, Israel and Palestine)
- I have a lot of questions about Israel and Palestine
- I have heard the term "Zionism" before
- I have heard of the World Zionist Congress
- I have a lot of strong feelings and ideas about Israel and Palestine
- I think diaspora Jews should be involved in decision making in Israel



Platforms & Elections

Materials:

- Whiteboard
- Copies of Platforms (Appendix)
- Laptop/screen
- Ballot box

Set Up:

- Space to watch a video
- Space for students to work together

Time needed:

20-30 min

Directions:

Start with a group brainstorm.

Ask students what VALUES are most important to them (examples: friendship, kindness, fairness, etc). Next, ask students what values they think should be important to the State of Israel (examples: fairness, religious freedom, cultural respect, democracy, etc). If you want, you can write their answers on the whiteboard, compare and contrast their personal values with the values for Israel.

Explain how the World Zionist Congress (WZC) works:

- Every five years, Zionist Jews around the world vote for people to represent them in the World Zionist Congress.
- The groups that get more votes get more seats, which means they have more collective power to have their voices heard and make decisions.
- Groups that have similar values form a coalition to build more power together.
- The WZC makes a lot of important decisions, including:
 - electing leadership for the World Zionist Organization,
 - deciding how to allocate funding for the Jewish Agency and the WZO,
 - shaping educational material about Israel and Zionism that will be shared with Diaspora Jews, and determining policy for the organization.
- Each representative in the Congress makes their decisions based on their religious and ethical values
- Diaspora Jews vote for groups that share their own personal values to make sure those are represented at the Congress
- Each group (called a "Slate") writes a Platform. A platform is their statement about what values and issues are most important to them, and what causes they will work on if elected. By looking at a slate's platform, you can determine if they share your values.

Let's explore a few Slates from 2020 and 2025.

Ask students to watch the videos and then respond to the following questions:

- What did you see? (People, symbols, places, etc)
- What did you hear? (Words, languages, music, etc)
- What symbols or phrases did you notice?
- Can you summarize this slate's platform (group message) in a few words?

Elections

Choose some of the Slates from the Appendix. Try to choose a variety of platforms so that students understand the diversity of political ideologies in the Congress.

For younger students, use the summaries of platforms that are written in simpler language. For older students, use the official platforms from the slates' websites.

Ask students to pair up and randomly distribute the platforms to each pair. Have students

- · read through their platform,
- identify the VALUES they see (explicitly or implictly)
- · highlight the words or phrases that stand out to them
- identify the core message of the group: what is emphasized, what is not mentioned, who is shown as the opposition of this group?
- For High School or Adult learners: ask participants to visit the websites of their assigned group to learn more.

Remind students to look carefully at the language used:

- What words grab your attention?
- What phrases do they use and what do those phrases mean in their context? (For example, many groups might use the phrase "Jewish identity", but mean different things)
- Who does this group consider "Us" and who do they consider "Others"

Ask students to prepare a 1 minute pitch for their slate.

Once all groups have given their pitch, have students cast TWO ballots; one can be for their group, but at least one must be for another group. (This will give more interesting election results.

Count the ballots and distribute seats based on percentage of votes. The total number of seats in your Congress is the number of students. A group that got 10% of the votes gets 10% of the seats; a group that got 40% of votes gets 40% of the seats, etc.



Building our Coalitions

Materials:

- Copies of Making Decisions (Appendix)
- Pencils

Set Up:

 Space for students to work together

Time needed:

20 min

Directions:

Split students into groups based on the winning slates of your election. Explain to students they are now representing their slate in the Congress. They likely will not be in the same group as they campaigned for, so now they should play the role of their assigned slate.

Making Decisions

Give each group a copy of the Making Decisions worksheet. Ask them to discuss each topic and make a decision based on their group's platform (which might contradict their own personal values; remember, this is role playing!).

Once each group has made their decisions, have them talk to the other groups to see who else might share their opinions on each issue. They might find that their group overlaps with one group on one issue but another group on another issue. They might also agree to vote with a group that shares most of their values, even if it means compromising on one issue, so that they can ensure they win their most important issue.


Explain to students this is how "coalitions" are formed: groups that have similar, but not identical, values cooperate and work together to build power.

Voting on Resolutions (Decisions)

Call a vote. Each student should vote Yes or No based on their group's decision. Tally up the votes and see what resolutions passed or failed.

Encourage students to notice that these decisions were made based on the power of each slate. A group that had more members got more votes and thus had more power. Remind them that the number of members in each group was determined by the election, so even though they didn't vote on issues in the first election, their choices of WHO to send to the Congress ended up determining how issues were decided. This is exactly how it works in the real Congress.

Closing Reflection

Materials:

Paper & pencil (optional)

Set Up:

 Space for students to work together

Time needed:

5-10 min

Directions:

Tell students you are going to reflect on this experience. They can journal or reflect with another student.

- Did you feel aligned with your assigned slates? Why or why not?
- If you felt out of sync with your assigned role, how did it feel to argue for a different side?
- The World Zionist Congress is the most direct way Diaspora Jews have an impact on policies in Israel. Do you think it's important for Diaspora Jews to make these decisions? Why or why not?
- The issues you discussed in your groups came from real discussions at the last Zionist Congress. What other issues do you wish would have been discussed?
- · What is one thing you learned today?
- · What is one question you still have?



Evaluating Student Success:

- Did students engage by participating in activities, asking/answering questions?
- How did students respond to the material? Curious? Thoughtful? Uninterested?
- · How did students show kavod (respect) to one another?
- How did students respond to the challenge to think more deeply about their own values in relationship to the State of Israel?

Descriptions of the Slates

Below are the platforms for some of the slates (in alphabetical order) running for seats in the 39th World Zionist Congress.

Suggestions:

- For younger students, there are brief, age appropriate summaries for each slate. For older students, there are direct quotes from each organization about their goals for the 2025 election. Please choose the appropriate material for your group.
- You don't need to use all of these platforms in your election simulation.
 Please read through and choose platforms for your students depending on their age/level.
- Different groups use different terms based on their ideology. One place
 this is most evident is whether a group uses the phrase "the West
 Bank"/ "occupied West Bank", or refers to that geographic area as
 "Judea-Samaria". Encourage students to pay attention to how the
 language in each platform signals specific values or beliefs.

AID Coalition

We want to create unity across all parts of Israeli society. We care about maintaining democracy in Israel, and ensuring that Israel is a liberal and just Jewish state that serves all its citizens.

Aish Ha'am

We are committed to fighting antisemitism, advancing Jewish unity, educating every Jew and defending Israel. We believe Israel's security, stability and global standing are under attack, and we need every Jew to stand with Israel to protect it.

ANU

We are proud Zionists and believers in the American dream. We want to build an Israel where every Jew can find their place. We believe that long term peace can only be found in a two-state solution where Israelis and Palestinians can live side-by-side.

Israel365

We believe that Israel belong only to the Jewish People, and that the twostate solution is a part of our enemy's goal to destroy the Jewish state. We want strong leaders who will uphold our belief that as the entire land of Israel belongs to the Jewish People.

Hatikvah

We want to build an Israel with equality for people of all races, religions and genders. We want to end the occupation in the West Bank and find diplomatic solutions to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. We believe in democracy, racial and gender equality, and a fair justice system.

Vote Reform

Zionist Organization of America

We are one of the oldest Zionist organizations and have been fighting for Israel since the first Congress in 1897. VOTE REFORM:

Reform Judaism and our vision of Israel as a democratic, pluralistic state face historic challenges. Ultra-Orthodox rabbis and extreme politicians control key levers of power and aim to relegate Reform Jews, women, LGBTQ+ Israelis, and ethnic minorities to secondary status.

Zionist Organization of America (ZOA)

ZOA's activism at the WZC began with the very first Congress in 1897, where we helped launch the effort to "establish for the Jewish people a publicly and legally assured home in" our homeland.

Since then, the ZOA Coalition has initiated and achieved numerous accomplishments for the Jewish people and the Jewish State of Israel. For example:


- In 1919, ZOA helped to negotiate the Jewish people's binding legal rights to the Land of Israel at the Paris Peace Conference;
- In 2015, ZOA Coalition initiated & passed the WZC's anti-BDS resolution which included preventing BDS targeting Judea and Samaria;
- In 2024, ZOA Coalition passed its numerous initiatives to help Israel's war efforts, Aliyah and combatting campus and other antisemitism.
- the ZOA Coalition initiated and obtained passage of the resolution requiring the use of the proper names "Judea and Samaria," instead of the de-Judaized name "West Bank." We make it clear that Judea-Samaria is historic, lawful Jewish land, not "occupied Palestinian territory."
- ZOA Coalition has been continuing our battle against anti-Israel boycotts. For instance, ZOA Coalition initiated and obtained passage of a resolution establishing a program to encourage buying Israeli products via a positive "Buy-cott"—an antidote to boycotts.

Want to Vote for the 39th World Zionist Congress?

The Congress elects the officers for the World Zionist Organization, sets priorities and policies for JNF, the Jewish Agency, and United Israel Appeal. The Congress also allocates funding and chooses educational goals for the Jewish Agency.

The World Zionist Congress is made up of delegates elected from a variety of political and religious positions. The more votes a coalition receives, the more seats they win and the more impact they can have.

Elections for the 39th WZC are March 10 - May 4, 2025.

To vote for the 39th World Zionist Congress, you must be:

- Jewish (and not subscribe to another religion)
- 18 years or older by June 30, 2025
- A U.S. citizen or a legal permanent resident in the U.S., with primary US residence
- Affirm your commitment to the Jerusalem Program (the Zionist movement platform)
- Have not voted in the November 2022 Knesset election (and will not vote in any future Knesset election which may be held prior to July 28, 2025)

The Reconstructionist Movement is part of the Hatikvah slate.
